

All money raised will go towards buying new furniture for our school library, helping to create an even more inviting space for reading.


KS2 Book-Inspired Art Exhibition

Flood Update

Attendance

I know it may feel like I am banging the drum again about attendance, but it truly is one of the biggest factors in children being successful at school.

While 90% attendance sounds good, it actually means a child misses around 19 days of learning each year - almost four weeks of school. Those missed lessons are difficult to recover and can have a real impact over time.

Recent Department for Education research (2025) shows just how important good attendance is. Children with attendance of 95% or above in Year 6 are around 30% more likely to achieve the expected standard in Reading, Writing and Maths in the KS2 SATs than children with attendance between 90-95%. Even missing just 10 days across the year significantly reduces a child's chances of achieving their best.

We absolutely understand that illness happens, but wherever possible, aiming for 95% attendance or better gives every child the strongest chance of success.

- 100% = 0 days missed - Best chance of success
- 95% = 9 days missed - Already 2 weeks lost
- 90% = 19 days missed - Nearly 4 weeks of learning

School Book Drop - Starting Next Week!

We are excited to share that a wonderful new Book Drop Project is launching in school next week! A group of enthusiastic parents and children have come together with a brilliant idea: to collect pre-loved books from our school community and redistribute them to families across the school.

From next week, plastic donation containers will be placed around the school for you to drop in any books you no longer need at home. We kindly ask that donated books are:

- Age-appropriate for primary school aged pupils
- In reasonably good condition (no torn pages or heavy damage)
